





Pride ran high from football season, where the team missed playoffs by only a few points, to


graduation, where we said goodbye to fewer than 60 of our friends and welcomed a freshman class of over a hundred.






What We Remember

Foreword...

The story of the Palacios Independent School District is a blend of the City of Palacios, many people, many cultures, many successes, and both large and small happenings. To chronicle its history is to touch on some of the most important events and to cherish some tidbits along the way.

The Beginning - 1901-1902

In the years 1901 and 1902, W. C. Moore, a Houston real estate man, conceived the idea of developing a 20,000 acre tract of land belonging to the late Abel H. "Shanghai" Pierce Estate. Hamilton Point, a part of this vast track known to cowmen as "Bull Pasture," was purchased by the Texas Rice Development Company which had been formed by Moore and a group of Louisiana land developers. At the same time these stockholders formed the Palacios City Townsite Company. The town was to be called Tres Palacios, but the Tres was dropped because an earlier post office had used the name. The first lots were sold in December 1902, and the first buildings were a cottage and a hotel (the present Luther Hotel).

Early Education

Various attempts were made to provide education resources for the youngsters of the community. A small, private school (tuition charged) of a few grades served a few children, but most of the early settlers were from northern states where free public schools were common. A resource for older students was the Palacios Baptist Academy founded in 1905 by Rev. Travis and local backers, but it was abandoned after about a decade. In 1905, the first county public school






was opened by subscription. Classes were held in a one-room frame house on Second Street at Humphrey Street (presently located at 304 Duson Street) with Miss Mayme Ayers (who later married the town's first medical doctor, J. R. Elliott) as the teacher with a \$60 per month salary for seven months.

Palacios ISD Formed - 1906

In the spring of 1906 Mr. J. W. Tompkins, a former teacher who now had quite a large family to educate, advocated the forming of an independent school district and the erection of a building. A bond election was called, and by a vote of 25-0, the citizens voted to form an independent school district. The first Board of Trustees meeting was held on May 18, 1906, to plan the





1906-07 school year and hire teachers. Using the Methodist Church's Pioneer Hall, the Masonic Lodge Building, and the one-room house on Second Street, school started in mid-September, 1906, with three teachers: Nellie Kennedy (later Mrs. Gray), Miss Posy, and W.C. Gray. Mr. Gray served as superintendent, principal, and teacher.

East Bay School Building - 1907

On January 8, 1907, the first bond election to construct a building for \$5,000 passed 22-0 with Pybus and Nelson, Palacios contractors, receiving the contract. The East Bay School was a traditional, white two-story frame schoolhouse with a bell tower and with foundation pillars high enough off the ground to afford the children a place to play in bad weather and to protect the building from possible hurricane tides. Even the smell was traditional due to a combination of the scent of floor oil, sweeping compound, paste, and bananas from the children's lunches. First year scholastics were 109 children between the ages of seven and seventeen.

Curriculum 1906-1913

The course of study was very basic, but it provided the necessary elements to prepare the students for both daily living and entrance into the higher learning institutions of the time. The primary grades (1-3) consisted of reading, spelling, writing, language, numbers, and general lessons (physiology, hygiene, geography, nature study, and songs); intermediate grades (4-7) consisted of the same, except arithmetic replaced numbers, grammar replaced language, and agriculture/civics were added; and the high school used the "credit system" of promotion with 14 credits of work completed for graduation. The courses covered English, history, mathematics, Latin, and science (including various specific subjects such as algebra, solid geometry, American history, English history,

and biology).

First Graduating Class

Palacios High School's first graduating class was the class of 1909. Members of the class were Edith Mapes, Nellie Wilcox, Emily Margerum, and Fred Clements. Miss Margerum taught school until she was 77 years of age; she passed away in 1990.

Cow Sheds and New High School - 1910-1913

While the East Bay School initially seemed large, it was not long before it was too small to house the children of the growing community. In the area where the school stood (at the corner of Second and Moore Streets) a number of small rooms were built behind the school. These rooms were dubbed "cow sheds" by the students. Also some of the students again attended classes in the Methodist Church and the Masonic building. The second school bond issue of \$25,000 passed on May 6, 1911, by a vote of 135-39. H. and A. E. Galbraith of Milford, Texas, contracted to build the new school, a three-story red brick located on two blocks between Fourth and Fifth and Ritchie and Perryman streets (where Central Elementary stands today). It housed the "grammar" grades (4-7) and the high school (8-11).


The Growth Years - 1913-1927

It took over a year to complete the "Big Red School," but an enthusiastic group of students moved into it in September, 1913. W. C. Gray had retired as superintendent, and the new superintendent, H.L.B. Skinner (1913-1918) led the district into an era of growth. Palacios ISD was to see many "firsts" during the next 14 years. A listing of these include:

- First school auditorium seating 626 was located on the third floor of the new school.
- First salary increase saw the superintendent receive \$125 per month, principals, \$75 and teachers, \$55.
- First modern restrooms were built in 1923 after all school toilets were burned down on October 31, 1923. The Halloween culprits were never apprehended, although a reward was offered.
- First home economics classes were taught in a house moved to the campus in 1924. (This house was moved to the campus of the new high school in 1936 and used as PISD tax collector's office from 1963-1982.)
- First state compulsory school attendance law went into effect February 1, 1917. Students ages 8-14 had to attend school at least 60 days each year.
- First school transportation system consisted of two rural carrier wagon routes to the areas north and west of town in 1913.
- PISD bought enough coal to heat the schools in 1915 for \$216.56 plus a freight bill of \$45.94.

RIGHT-First high school: The "Big Red School" completed in 1913

- In 1916, high school was conducted with three teachers, a study hall matron and a principal/teacher C. V. Snyder (first time the superintendent did not serve as principal).
- Trustee's Oath of Office in 1919 included "I have not fought a duel with deadly weapons."
- First yearbook, <u>The Driftwood</u>, was published by the Senior Class of 1916. The editor was Victor H. Clements, and the faculty censor was Miss Francesca Taylor. Yearbook sections were literary, organizations, athletics, artist, cartoonist, and classes.
- Organized athletics began in the 1913-14 school year with boys' football and baseball and girls' basketball.
- While very few coaches names can be found, the 1917 football coach was a female, Marianna Elder. After graduating from Baylor University, she agreed to coach the team when a male coach was not available. Others were Oscar Bogard (1919) and H. A. Miller (1920) at \$10 per month salaries.
- School colors were chosen in 1917 to be maroon and white with the players purchasing their own uniforms from Sears and Roebuck.
- In 1916, Palacios High School became one of the first Texas high schools to gain regional accreditation by The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. (1991 finds PHS one of the few Texas high schools to retain continuous accreditation for 75 years.)
- School enrollment grew to 412 in 1919-1920 and 486 in 1920-21.
- In the mid-1920s the high school junior class decided that the school should have a mascot. An election was held, and the winning suggestion was submitted by Jessie Parsutt (now Mrs. Clarence Buller). The PHS mascot has been the Sharks ever since.
- P.I.S.D. was one of the first school districts to have a female as its superintendent. Miss Linnie Wolf served as superintendent from August 10, 1918, to March 28, 1919, and from July 1, 1921 to December 30, 1924. Miss Linnie was barely five feet tall, but she commanded the respect of the big boys who dared not upset her. She did not like administrative duties but served as superintendent because the trustees and community needed her. Her beloved English finally won the battle, and she resumed her teaching duties. Other superintendents during these years were H. A. Miller (3-28-19 to 6-19-21), and W. A. Smith (1-12-25 to 6-19-27). Other high school principals were A. C. Rogers, (1918-19); Linnie Wolf (1919-21); R.E.Rogers (1921-23); and H.C. Lewis (1923-27).

The Newsom Era - 1927-1964

On July 1, 1927, the Palacios I.S.D. trustees hired as superintendent 29-year-old Ralph P. Newsom. For 37 years Newsom would give outstanding leadership TOP- East Side Elementary, during World War II (1943). MIDDLE- Second High School, built in 1935. BOTTOM- Westside School, site of Rainbow Land Day Care.







through the "Great Depression," World War II, Korean War, Camp Hulen expansion, the jet age, and to the brink of the computer age. When Newsom began his work, P.I.S.D. was a district of some 24 square miles with about 400 students, two campuses with a shortage of teaching equipment, and a high school that offered only 17 credits. During the next 37 years many

events and people became a part of the improvement and growth of the school district including:

- The home economics department was updated in 1927.

- In 1928, vocational agriculture was added with R. D. Rawls as the teacher.

- In 1932 the Negro School Building was moved to the site where the Rainbow Day Care Center is now located. The current building was constructed in 1939 from plans drawn by two students, Guy Claybourn and Ray Anders. Lola Mulkey was the teacher in 1932; Granville and Carita Sanford joined the teaching staff later. Mr. Sanford was the principal until P.I.S.D. integrated in 1963.

- On June 14, 1935, a bond election for a \$50,000 high school building passed 220-14. With these funds and some federal assistance, the building was completed in 1936. Located at Second and Humphrey Streets, this modern high school included up-to-date departments of business, science, library, and a gymnasium/auditorium.

- Yearbooks appeared again in 1939 and continue to be a part of the school to this day. They were not published during war years, however, due to supply shortages. - With the activation of Camp Hulen as a full-time federal military base in 1940, the schools again became overcrowded. Supt. Newsom made a train trip to Washington, D.C., and was able to secure a federal grant to build a new elementary school. East Side Elementary School, located between Second, Fourth, Johnson, and Perryman Streets, opened for classes in September 1943 for grades 1-6. Mrs. Claire Partain Burton was the first principal with Miss Elizabeth Sisson following in 1945. During the war years and for several years afterward, East Side students and faculty produced a number of musical programs to entertain the various peoples from throughout the United States who were here due to Camp Hulen. All the children performed

in colorful costumes on various holiday

themes.

Palacios Junior High School 1943

With the destruction of old East Bay School in the late 1930s and the building of East Side Elementary School in 1943, the "Big Red" School became the Palacios Junior High School for grades 7-9 with Vivian Newsom

as principal. With one of the first junior highs in South Texas, P.I.S.D. now consisted of an elementary school (grades 1-6), a junior high school (grades 7-9), and a high school (grades 10-12). Palacios High School was one of the first high schools to add (in 1939) grade 12.

Annexation and Consolidation

The area served by the P.I.S.D. began to grow in 1938 when the district annexed all of the bays surrounding it: Tres Palacios Bay, Turtle Bay, and Matagorda Bay. Before World War II, there were over 8,000 independent and common school districts in Texas. After the war, with new state education agency requirements, an avalanche of annexations and consolidations took place. Palacios, the largest independent school district in the area, led the way. March 22, 1947, saw the Turtle Bay School District added to Palacios ISD, followed by the districts of Collegeport, Pecan City, Citrus Grove, and Prairie Center on October 20, 1947, Carancahua and Deutschburg districts on October 11, 1948, and finally, the Ben F. Ward School District on February 19, 1949. The P.I.S.D. grew to 438 square miles and became a county-line school district serving Matagorda and Jackson Counties. The district now touches the Colorado River on the east and Lavaca Bay on the west.

East Side Elementary moved into the Second Street Junior and Senior High School facilities, and the WWII East Side building was torn down. At the same time, the junior and senior high schools moved to their present locations.

Athletics in the Newsom Era

Palacios schools have always fielded strong athletic competitors; this era was no different. Palacios High School football teams won or shared district or higher titles in 1935, 1942, 1950, 1953, 1959, 1962, and 1963. The 1950 team coached by Sharkey Shelton won the regional championship. In 1959, Coach Joe Newbill and Coach Tony Carr took their team to the state semifinals before falling to Brady High.

-The 1956 girls' basketball team won district under the leadership of coach Joanna Hendricks.

-During this period the boys' track and field teams consistently won district championships. The Palacios Junior High teams of the late 40s, 50s, and early 60s under coaches George Holst, Charles Shreve, R.D. Renfro, and Roy Wauson were dominant in all sports. The softball teams won championships for 10 straight years (1947-1957).

Junior High Mascot

In 1948 the Palacios Junior High School athletic lettermen selected the Hornet as school mascot and school colors of blue and white. (In the early 1960s the colors were changed to red and white, and in 1980, the mascot was changed to the Sandshark by a vote of the student body.)

School Building Bond Issues

With the need to upgrade the school district's facilities, the citizens in February, 1952, by a vote of 450-272, passed a bond issue for \$700,000 to build Central Elementary School and Palacios Junior High School. Central was located in front of the "Big Red School" and was occupied in September, 1953. After 41 years of service, the "Big Red School"

was torn down. Palacios Junior High School, later to become East Side Elementary, was occupied in March, 1954, at Second and Ritchie Streets and demolished in 1990 as East Side Elementary was modernized. The next bond issue, this time for \$1,000,000, was passed in 1961 by a vote of 306-86. New junior and senior high schools were built for \$900,000 at a location one-half mile west of the city on Shark Drive, and eight new classrooms were built at Central Elementary. In 1963,

Special Education

Palacios I.S.D. started the first special education program in Matagorda County in the early 1950s under the guidance of Evelyn Dismukes at East Side. It was also one of the first schools in the state to recognize the needs of these special students. Joyce Carr brought the program to Central in 1957, and Mary Griffin to the Iunior High in 1963-64.

School Colors

The Palacios High school colors were changed to red and white around 1952 by a vote of the student body.

Hurricane Carla

The school district received the most property damage that it has ever received on September 11, 1961, when Hurricane Carla struck the City of Palacios and the entire north central part of the Texas Coast. Although the damage was severe (32 inches of water in the Junior High and much damage to East Side and Palacios High), the leadership of Supt. Newsom, the help of Vice-President Lyndon Johnson, and the hard work of many had classes operating after two weeks while

repair continued during the 1961-62 school year.

Integration

On June 10, 1963, the Board of Trustees under the

leadership of S. Woodrow Wilson, trustee president, voted to fully integrate grades 1-12 beginning with the 1963-64 school year. This action ended a long period of school segregation and answered a ruling of the 1954 U.S. Supreme Court. Integration was successful from the beginning.

Sixties to the Nineties


Joe Ward was elected to the superintendency on July 1, 1964. Supt. Ward came to the district at a time the federal government began making considerable amounts of money available to schools under President Lyndon Johnson's "Great Society" administration. These funds allowed the district to obtain audio-visual teaching tools, establish remedial education, and improve the library programs. Ward resigned in late July, 1967, and the Board of Trustees, on August 1, 1967, appointed Junior High School Principal George Holst as superintendent. Holst served the district as superintendent for 18 years (to June 30, 1985).

Balanced District Program Goal

Mr. Holst led the district to adopt the major goal of a "Balanced School Education Program." For the next 18 years, many resources (community people, students, staff members, and financial opportunities) were used as the district gradually moved to establish and maintain a strong vocational education program (to meet local needs), a strong fine arts program, and a strong co-curricular program while continuing the district's excellent core-academic and extra-curricular programs.

Athletics: 1963-1988

The 60s in boys' athletics and the late 60s to the late 80s in girls' athletics proved to be bright days for PHS. After winning the district championship in football in 1962 and 1963, the 1964 Shark football team won 14 straight games including a 12-0 defeat of Marlin High school for the State AA Football Championship. All-State players quarterback Robby Shelton and guard Paul Fields led a team of outstanding football players including John Jackson, Ronnie Fields, Robert Tanner, Joe Dan Huffman, Royce Brune, James Dismukes, Ricky Conrad, Jerry Haynes, James Henry, Montray Pinkston, Sylvester Polk, Buddy Lenz, Charles Eikenberg, Henry Guillen, Billy Kubecka, Trinidad Constancio, Jodie Anthis, Walter Bowers, Ralph Brown, Kenneth Hamlin, Andy Jensen, Gordon Willis, James Gibson, Stewart Gillett, Henry Adams, and Douglas Kubecka. The Shark's head coach, Charles Shreve was named a Coach-of-the-Year finalist. Coach Charles Wiggs' track and field team of 1967 won the AA State Championship after finishing second to Taylor High School in 1966. Key point makers were Ernest Haynes,



Donald Washington, Roland Flores, Charles Polk, and Joe Buckley who set state records in the sprint relay and the mile relay. Other team members were: Richard Dobson, Roland Jenkins, Terry Harvey, Donnie Schroeder, Edward Luna, Henry Washington, Buddy Lenz, Charles Fizmorris, Thurman Roy, Bruce Remlinger, Thomas Kocurek, Nat Adkins, Charles Garcia, Donnie Lenz, and Ricky Garza. In 1968 the Sharks finished fourth in the State track and Field meet. The Shark football team of 1969 were District Tri-Champions with Yoakum and Needville.

The Sharkettes won the district basketball Championship in 1970 under Coach Linda Puckett. Outstanding players included Holly Harrison, Karen Johnson, and Sylvia Laslie. In 1978 the Sharkette basketball team had its most outstanding season by reaching the State Girls Basketball Tournament before losing in the semi-finals. Coach Charlotte Matthew's team included Debbie Polk, Tami Petersen, Cheryl McMullen, Charlette Schneider, Nancy Anderson and Annette Uher.

The eighties saw Coach Luz Arredondo's cross-country and track and field teams place high in the state meets. Among the leading athletes were Ann Herlin, Barbara Buckley, Lisa Harvey and Shuronda Roy. The Sharkettes placed second in the State Track and Field Meet in 1986 and 1988.

Regional Accreditation

In 1974 the P.I.S.D. became the first school district in the Central Gulf Coast area and Matagorda County to earn full regional accreditation from kindergarten through the twelfth grade. The Southern Association




of Colleges and Schools continues to accredit Palacios High (1916), Palacios Junior High (1958) and East Side and Central Elementaries (1974).

Increased Services 1967-85

During these years the district increased its academic subject offerings; developed a localized vocational program (14 units including such offerings as Marine-Related Occupations, Construction Trades, Farm Mechanics, Cosmetology, and Co-ops); increased special education and remedial programs, expanded counseling services; and added kindergarten classes and speech therapy.

Last Annexation

On June 17, 1968, the Palacios I.S.D. annexed 280 square miles in the Gulf of Mexico. With the P.I.S.D. now covering 718 square miles, the days of greatly



increased oil, gas, and pipeline tax money were not far behind. During the next 17 years, the district constructed and renovated over \$11,000,000 worth of facilities and buildings. The off-shore money was the major factor for this building until the 1982-83 tax year when the South Texas Nuclear Project became the district's major income source. Major buildings and facilities constructed during this time were the Fine Arts Complex, Maintenance Complex, Administration Building, four Learning Resource Centers, Vocational Building, Field House, and all-weather track.

The South Texas Nuclear Project

The South Texas Nuclear Project was announced in June 1973, with the first ground work starting in 1975. Owned by Houston Lighting and Power Company, Central Power and Light, City of Austin, and City of San Antonio, the plant brought change in the district due to increased student enrollment and district income. After many years of construction problems, the two nuclear generators were completed in 1988 and 1989.

New Community Members

At the close of the Vietnam War, many Southeast Asians settled on the Texas Gulf Coast. In 1975, Asst. Supt. W.J. Arrington, with the help of Father Joe Pham, welcomed the first 17 Vietnamese students to P.I.S.D.

Outstanding Programs

In 1983, Palacios High School became one of the first schools with fewer than 1,000 student high school enrollment to participate in the Academic Decathlon. Fine Arts programs became outstanding during the period of 1963-91. The choir program under Mike

Petrisky won Sweepstakes from district to state competition on many occasions. Under the leadership of Manuel Garza, James Marioneaux, and Mike Cole, the band won several Sweepstakes. Gloria Walter's theater arts program produced district one-act play winners on many occasions while her debate teams and other groups were successful on the state level.

Project 2000 and New Leadership

On July 1, 1985, Dr. William Reaves, Jr. was elected to the superintendency. The goals adopted as a result of Project 2000 initiated an "Effective Schools" concept. Developments included a district discipline management plan, positive behavior programs, and revised curriculum guides. Two assistant principals were hired. Highlights under Dr. Reaves's leadership include:

Building Program

The old high school on the East Side campus was renovated in 1986-87 to provide classroom space and

to make the old gym usable. East Side also added a new wing to house 12 classroom for the 4th and 5th grades in 1988-89 and a wing containing administrative services, cafeteria, teachers' workroom and six 3rd grade classrooms in 1989-90. Construction was completed on the Marine Education Center in 1989-90. Two Learning Resource Centers were completed: at the Junior High in the fall of 1985 and at Central in the fall of 1986.

Major Events 1985-86

The first annual Academic Achievers Awards Program was initiated. The top ten percent of the senior class were given the opportunity to recognize their most influential teachers. Computer classrooms were installed at East Side, Junior High and High School.

Oscar Giles, Shark football standout, was named a national High School All-American. Student Life:

-Enrollment peaked in P.I.S.D. at 1690 students. A number of new electronic courses were added to the curriculum, including Nuclear Electronics Technology.

-Daniel Tucker received the American Farmer Degree.

-The High School choir formed a group called the Palace Singers to perform for community and school activities.

-The district hosted 3 exchange students from Yugoslavia, Iceland, and Turkey

Major Events 1987-88

Student Life-

-The Palace Singers performed at the White House for President and Mrs. Reagan. The Junior High Choir won sweepstakes in sight reading at District XIII. The high school placed 12 members on All-Region XIII choir.

-The High School Band won the Region XIII UIL Sweepstakes Award.

Athletics-

Shuronda Roy (400m dash) and Ann Herlin (3200m run) were state champions. Barbara Buckley brought home a silver in the 800m run and a bronze in the 1600m run. The Sharkette runners claimed their third






consecutive Region III Championship, their fifth consecutive district Cross Country title.

-The Academic Decathletes, coached by Mrs. Susie Joyce, competed at state for the first time after winning second in the small schools division at the regional meet.

-East Side Elementary was among 13 Texas elementary schools recognized for its excellence by the U.S. Dept. of Education. Representatives were honored at the White House by President Bush.

-PHS Mock Trial team, coached by Gloria Walter, represented Region III in the State Tournament.

-PHS students exchanged visits with Gilpin, Colorado, students and participated in the Gilpin Wilderness Program.

-Debra Nelson won third in a state poetry contest sponsored by the Catholic Daughters of America.

1971-Bruce Elliott received the American Farmer Degree, a national award.

1973-Helen Haynes, senior, won lst in state in the long jump.

1976-PHS Office Education Association team (now Business Professionals of America) won first in state for their promotional office education display and won honorable mention at the national level.





Speech





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


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






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
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
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
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
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
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


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Colophon

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
