
When I left Archie, in search of more old classmates, I decided to go to Blessing; fearing the heavy traffic, I chartered a private plane. To my amazement, the pilot was

Their present production is "Aaron Slick from Punkin Crick."


It is expected to be a great hit, and will, no doubt, bring them world-wide fame.


This will will be recognized as entailed estates, to which we do declare the class of 1952, the real and rightful successor.

To Howard Hurta, Franklin Treumer's privilege of flirting with all of the Tidehaven girls.







In the presence of all present, in the witness thereof; we hereunto set our hand this twenty-fourth day of May, A.D., 1951.




If you want to talk to a real sportsman, just find Hoss Hale. He has been hunting practically all summer, but I understand his moose hunt is the most outstanding.
