



It was named because it was in the midst of open fields practically equal distance from Ganado to the west, El Campo to the north, Bay City to the east, and Palacios to the south. For many years, the postal department called the town 'Midfields,' but they were finally persuaded to drop the plural and call it 'Midfield.' In 1903, the first general merchandise store was opened. There was a school, but it unfortuanately burned down in 1929.







Did You Know ...?

...The name 'Blessing' was Jonathan E. Peirce's second choice to name the town, after the postal service rejected his first choice of 'Thank God' in gratitude for the coming of the railroad. The first post office was built in 1903, and a library was built between 1903 and 1905. In 1909, a newspaper was established which was called **Blessing News.** Last recorded, the town's population was 571, although Blessing once exceeded the population of 1200 in the year 1966.

Did You Know ...?

...Buckeye had a company store and a boarding house. In 1905, thirty-five students were taught in a nearby one-room school. The community secured a post office in 1907. In 1914, the community had 100 residents and a canning company, a truck-farming association, a general store, a lumberyard, a hotel, a telegraph agent, and a telephone connection. In 1936, a church, several dwellings, and three businesses were there. However, in 1940, the population had dwindled to twenty-five people. The post office closed in 1971 and the current population is still reported as twenty-five.





Did You Know ...?

First known as Hardy, this town came into being around 1908, when oil was discovered and the Hardy #1 well was drilled. The name was later changed to Clemville in honor of F.J. Clemenger, who helped develop the oil field. In May of 1911, a post office was established in Clemville. The town continued to grow with a church, two stores, a cafe, hotels, and service stations. There was a school until Clemville was consolidated with Markham. Clemville is almost a ghost town now, with little physical evidence remaining of the once booming town.

Time to Celebrate



Book Smarts



Language Arts is a basic class that is vital to a student's path to a successful career after graduation. In most classes, you think that the information you are given is something you will more than likely never use in your future. But what about those other classes? Will you ever use what you have learned or will it all be for nothing? In some cases, yes, some of the information might not be useful to you depending on your career. But what if you had to write an essay to get a job or apply for college or scholarships? Or what about typing up a resume for a summer job? Suddenly you are grateful for those classes that were required of you to take that you thought were so boring. In the english classes, students are continuously learning new vocabulary, improving spelling, punctuation, and capitalization, and writing simple, compound and complex-compound sentences. Students in the upper classes learn how to use the library for their research papers. These papers help the students to become more familiar with the writing process, analyzing and interpreting texts, and learning how to organize and compile information into a report.



English classes really do seem difficult, hard and trying at times, but in the long run, you may realize that the teachers have been trying to prepare you for what may lay ahead in the years to come.

Business Computer Information Systems, more commonly known as BCIS, is the course that fulfills a student's Technology Application credit required for graduation. In BCIS, students learn about and apply word processing, database, spreadsheets, desktop publishing and presentation management technology to many projects during the class time. For example, while learning spreadsheets, students had to make a spreadsheet that showed the sale of animals at the Matagorda County Fair and the amount paid for each animal sold. For power point activities, students researched different holidays and then gave a presentation using power point and the clip art they had found. If the students fulfill all the requirements of the class, they are able to earn credit hours from Victoria College.

During the school year, students in science classes have many hands-on experiences to test their knowledge. Experiments are performed to enhance the class lectures. In chemistry, students conducted field laboratory investigations, used scientific methods during investigations and made informed decisions using critical thinking and scientific problem solving. Students studied a variety of topics that included characteristics of matter, energy transformations during physical and chemical changes, the atomic structure and the periodic table of elements. Other topics that were covered included behavior of gases, bonding, nuclear fusion and fission, oxidation-reduction reactions, chemical equations, solutes, properties of solutions, acids and bases, and chemical reactions.





Watch Out, Picasso!

Perception and creative expression is part of the basics of art. And that is what Tidehaven art students were expose to this school year. These basics along with learning of the historical and cultural heritage of art are part of what make up the art program. Students had to rely on their perceptions of the environment, developed through increasing visual awareness and sensitivity to surroundings, memory, imagination, and life experiences as a source for creating artworks. They expressed their thoughts and ideas creatively, while challenging their imagination, fostering reflective thinking, and developing disciplined effort and problem-solving skills.

Students in the art class were provided ample opportunities and projects to test their creativity with during the school year. After learning of prehistoric art in Western Europe, art in ancient Egypt, Greek art and Roman art along with the art of India, China and Japan and the native arts of the Americas, students were made more aware of the many styles of art in the world. Medieval and gothic art were also covered, as were Baroque and Rococo art. All of these types of art made the students familiar with the techniques that they would get to experiment with in class. After learning the basic techniques of drawing, such as sketching and shadowing, class members were given ample time to experiment with many types of paints, including acrylics and oils. 



The Agriculture department offers a variety of classes, varying from Equine with Mr. Cornelius to Plant and Soil Science with Mr. Meinardus. Equine is a class designed to help students develop knowledge and skills pertaining to the selection, nutrition, reproduction, health and management of horses. In Plant and Soil Science, students study about the plant and soil science as it related to soil and plant relationships that affect the production of food and fiber. 

Ten students in the Tidehaven High School Life Skills class learn the basics of everyday life in a classroom setting. Those skills are then taken out into the community and used to help these students with independent living skills they will use later in life. Students have daily activities. Some of these include health and hygiene, housekeeping chores, cooking, math skills, exercising, reading newspapers, using computers, practicing writing, and using cooperative participation at recreation and leisure time. The students also get daily experience with washing, drying and folding towels, dishclothes, and aprons for both the High School and Junior High cafeterias. The revenue that the students earn from doing this laundry is used to help fund field trips. Class members have taken several field trips this year. Some places they have toured are the Bay City Fire Station, Edith Armstrong Center, the Lake Jackson Mall, and the Aquarium and IMAX in Galveston, and the Palacios Marine Center. To earn extra spending money and to allow the students hands-on accounting skills, the class members sell chips, pickles, sodas, candy and homemade cookies to students at Tidehaven High School. With that money, the students have shopped for Christmas presents at Target, for cooking, baking, selling and various party supplies at Sam's and HEB, bought supplies for Christmas, Mother's Day and Father's Day crafts at Hobby Lobby, and bought flowers at Walmart. They planted those flowers in a garden by the classroom. The money has also been used to practice ordering and eating out skills at A&A Barbecue, Church's, Mr. Gatti's, Diamond S, Luby's, Wendy's, Whataburger, K2 Steakhouse and Cattleman's.

Several of the students have on-campus and off-campus jobs. One student, Joe Johnson, works at HEB in Bay City for half the day. Another student, Joe Delgado, works in the Bus Barn for an hour or two each day. One student, Stacy Vaculin, works in the school office and, when needed, at the Administration Office.



A new course was presented to students at Tidehaven this year - A+ Certification. This computer course is an industry-standard certification course that is essential for anyone desiring to work in the area of computer repair or technical support. Because this is a very technical course, the class was limited to four to six students with preference given to those who have has Algebra 2, geometry, and chemistry. Topics covered in the class included basic PC architecture, peripheral devices, Windows 9x and Windows 2000 operating systems, upgrades and basic troubleshooting and repair. Students had to opportunity to become A+ certified after passing the certification test and also had the opportunity to work with the district for pay during their spare time. The first part of the course consisted of learning the basic terms, concepts and functions relating to the main microcomputer modules. Students learned how to follow established procedures for assembly and disassembly of systems and replaceable modules. Following this, students were given instruction on installing, configuring and upgrading the main modules. Instructions were also given on printer types and basic printer concepts, as well as printer components, functions and service techniques. In the next step of the course, students were given instructions on the functions and structure of Windows 9x and Windows 2000. Additionally, they learned how to navigate through an operating system using both command line prompts and the Windows GUI. The course also covered procedures for installing, configuring and upgrading Windows 9x and Windows 2000.




















With all of these interested players, Tidehaven should be well represented in the local tennis circuit next year.










To this end, Tidehaven participates in academic competition ranging from spelling















The Tiger was printed on 80# enamel paper with a press run of 150 copies, consisting of 160 pages with one four page color tip-in and sixteen pages of spot color. The book sold for \$27, \$30 and \$33 progressively, with an additional \$3 for cover name. At distribution time in August, the books were available for \$36 on a first come basis.

Body copy for the book was Embassy, with Nouveau Gothic Italic used for captions. Traditional headlines were printed using Embassy Bold, with subheads printed in Nouveau Gothic Italic. Panel names were printed using Memento. The book, trimmed to $7\ 3/4"\ x\ 10\ 1/2"$, had a cover designed by the students attending the summer workshop at Sam Houston State University.

The yearbooks were printed by Taylor Publishing Company of Dallas, at the El Paso plant location. The staff was assisted by customer service representative, Ryan Almon. Special thanks to Ryan for all of his wonderful ideas and help with the page layouts.

Portraits and group pictures were taken by Life Touch Studios of Stafford. All individual portraits from all four schools were photographed by Life Touch. Candid photos were taken primarily by staff photographers with some photos provided as a courtesy by others. The yearbook was produced using the Ultravision yearbook computer design program on three PCs.

The Tiger is produced using only monies raised by staff members. Fundraisers include selling ads for the yearbook and providing supplies for football concession stands, in addition to yearbook sales.

The yearbook is advised by Renee Huff.
