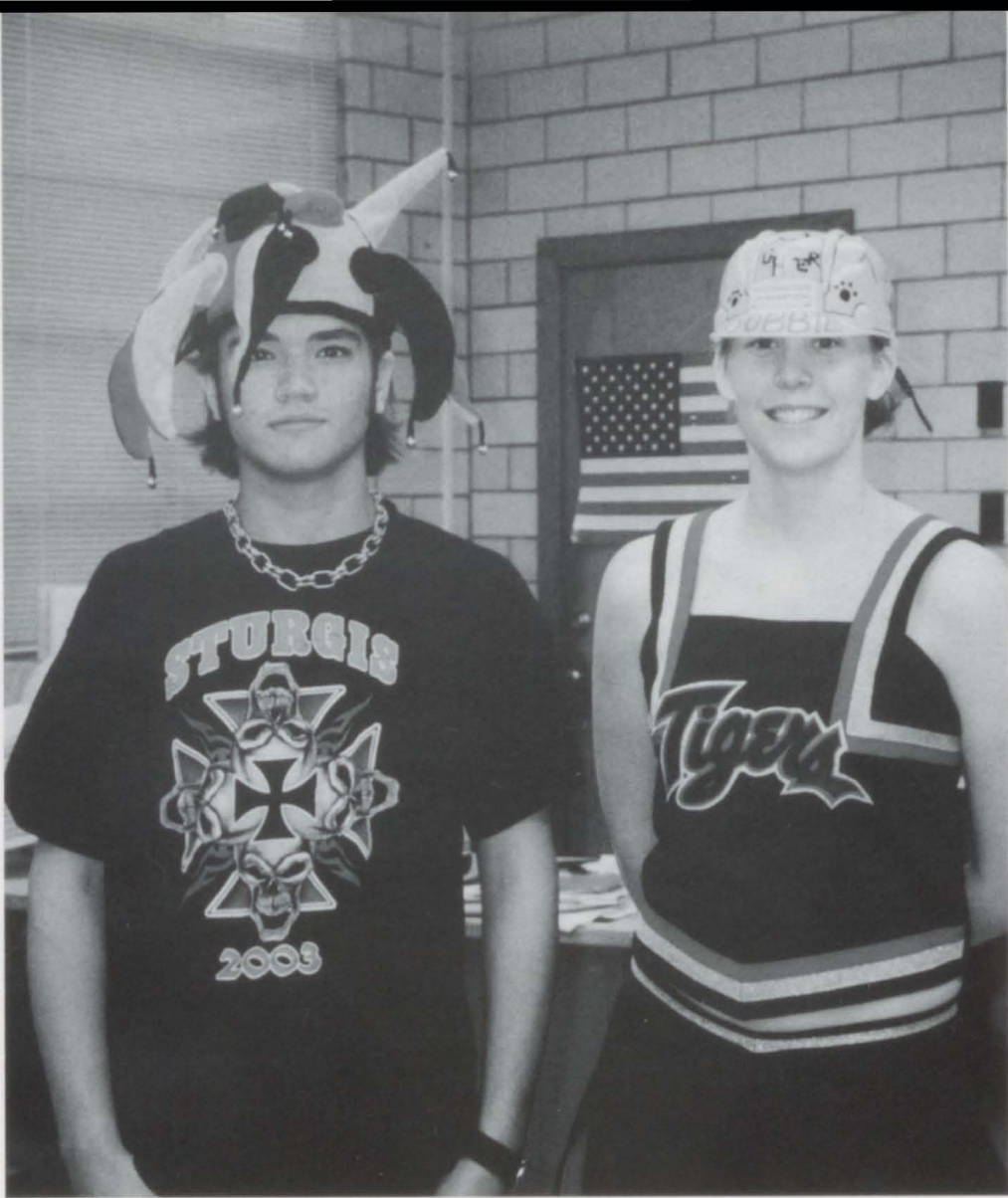

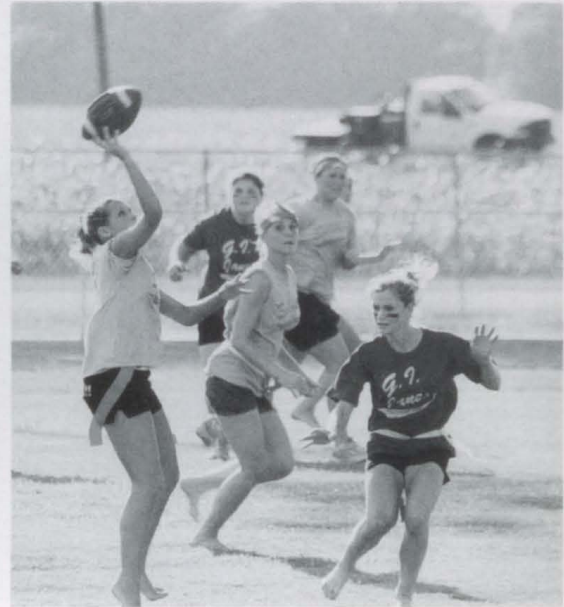

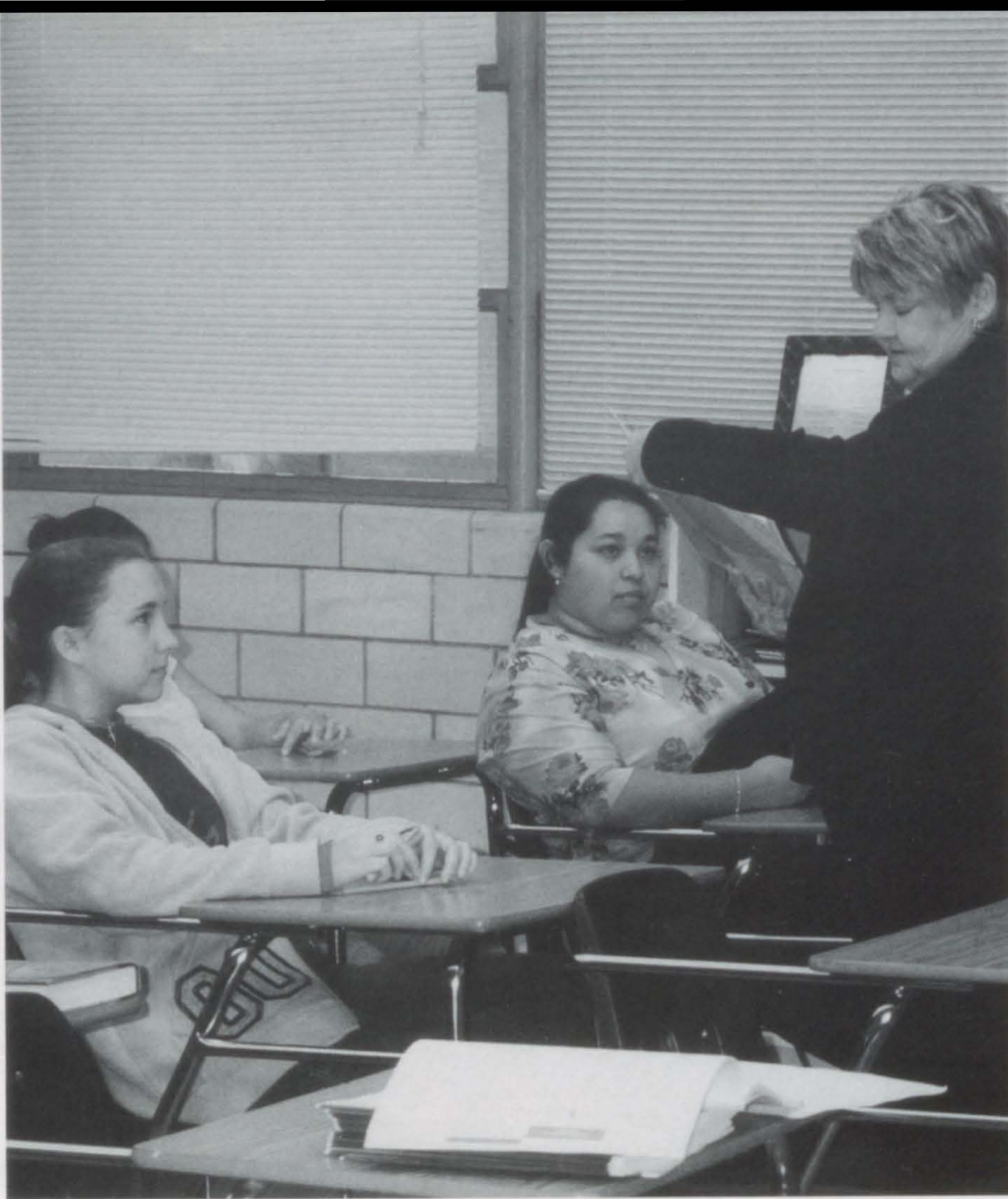

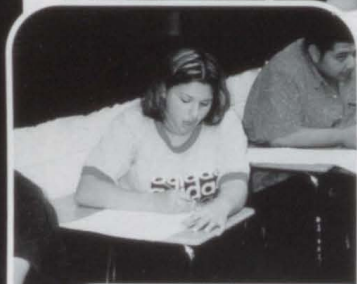

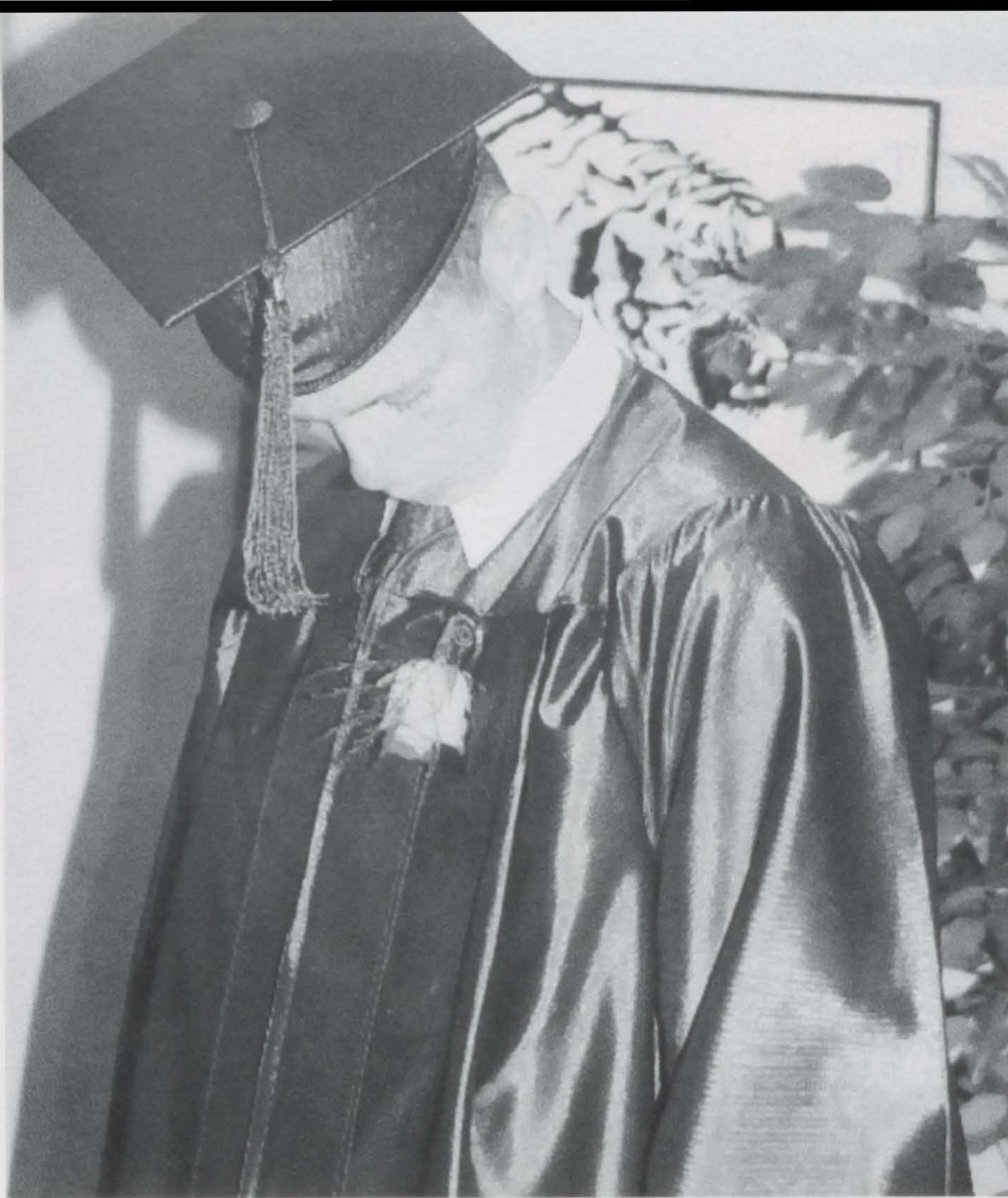

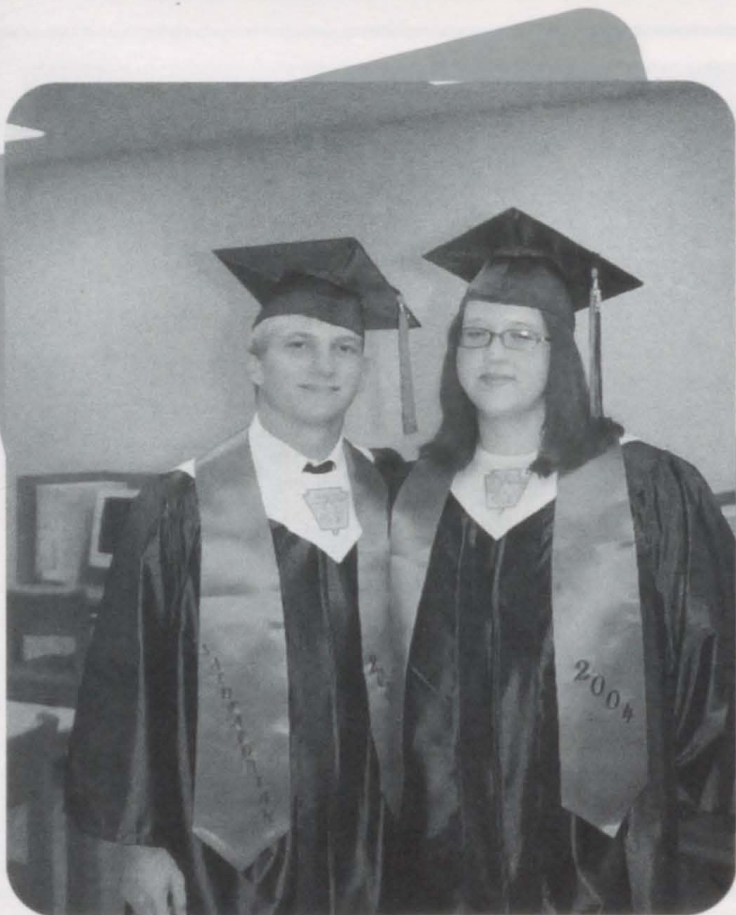


The Buffet of Life

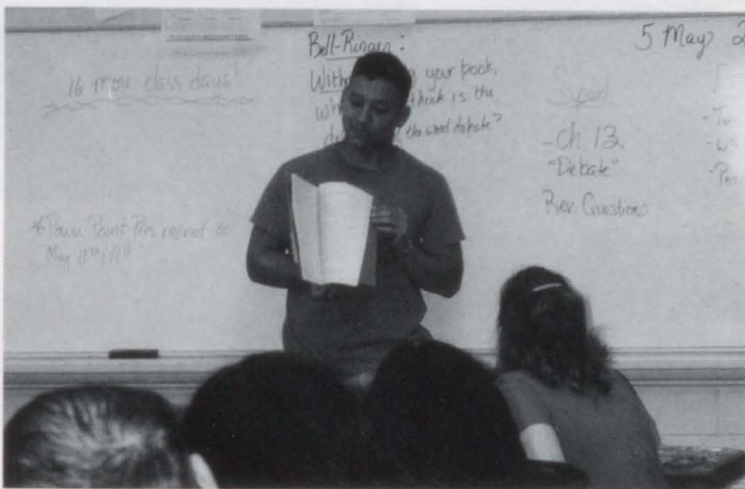


With four years of required English courses, teachers are often looking for ways to enhance the curriculum so that it will be interesting to the students. In Mrs. Yoxtheimer's English II class, the students wrote their research papers over people from the World War II era. Each student had to have at least fifty note cards covering their topic with a final report that was to be four to six pages long. Along with the paper, the students created a poster describing their topic. The subjects ranged from Winston Churchill to Adolf Hitler.

For Mrs. Socha's English III class, students put together portfolios over people from the Harlem Renaissance. They selected a topic, researched it, looked for literature and music that represented their topics and composed their own poetry about the subject. To lighten the load of writing, the students were to show their creative side by decorating the pages of their portfolios to represent their individual topics as well as creating the book covers. 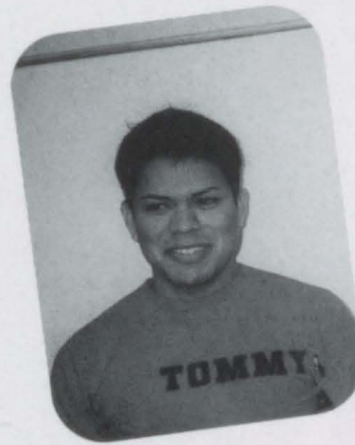

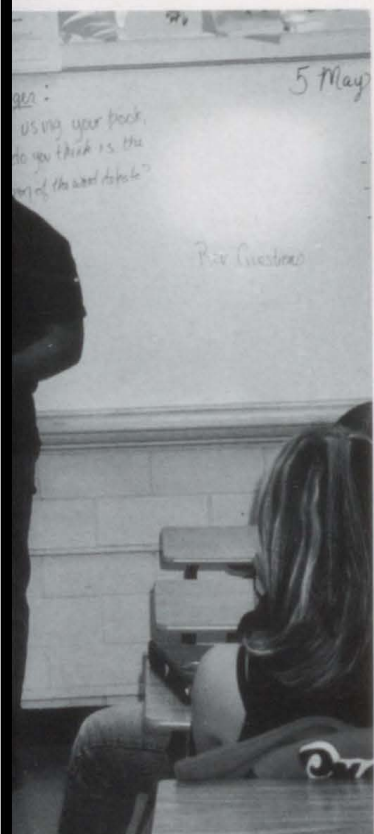

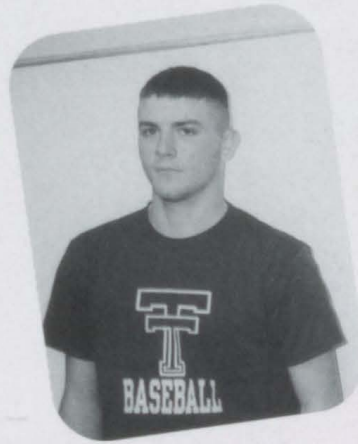
Eight students composed the Physics class. The students began what would be a very busy year by learning about incline problems, projectile motion and equilibrium. For incline planes, the students performed experiments using wooden cars and ramps. They then used a pendulum to fully understand the effects of projectile motion. Class members also learned about the difficult subject of vectors, which was so complicated that it took a full six-weeks to cover all of the material and the students still do not understand the concept. After completing this lesson, the students took time to learn more about buoyancy. This lesson helped them to build boats made of only cardboard and duct tape. To get an idea of how the cardboard boats would manage in the water, the students first made clay boats and tested them in overflow beakers. They then tested their cardboard boats in a competition at the Bay City pool. One boat sank, being too narrow, but the other was able to make the length of the pool.

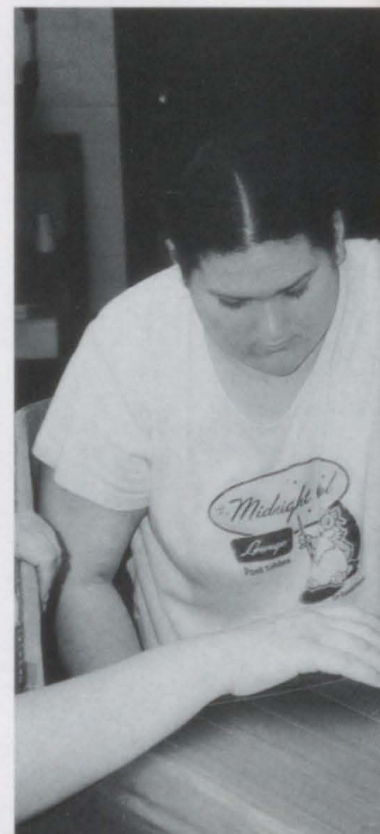

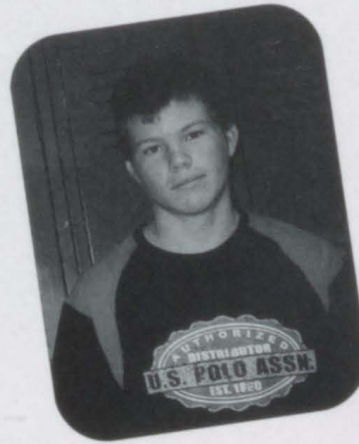

Cooking and sewing are still two of the most important aspects of the Family and Consumer Sciences courses offered at Tidehaven. As one can see from these pictures, that is what the students most enjoy. As a special treat, students were given a demonstration by Petty Officer Cheaney of the U.S. Navy on how to properly ice and decorate a cake. As part of his career in the Navy, Cheaney has been a cook and has also decorated cakes as a side job.

In Personal and Family Development, a one year course, students get to cook and sew and also cover other topics such as personal development, family relations and consumerism. For the cooking portion of the class, students are given the opportunity to choose and prepare recipes that they have selected. By doing this, students were careful to choose recipes with ingredients familiar to them. At the end of the second semester, sewing projects occupy most of the class time. Projects ranged from stadium blankets and pillows to stuffed animals and shorts.

Child Development and Preparation for Parenting are two more choices for students. In the Preparation for Parenting class, students are made aware of prenatal care and development, the process of delivery and the stages of growth of babies, infants, and young children. Eight students in the Tidehaven High School Life Skills class learn the basics of everyday life in a classroom setting. These skills are then taken out into the community and used to help the students with independent living skills they will use later in life. Students have daily activities, which include housekeeping chores, cooking, math skills, reading newspapers, using computers, practicing writing, and using cooperative participation at recreation and leisure time. The students also get daily experience with washing, drying and folding towels, dishtowels, and aprons for both the High School and Junior High cafeterias. The revenue that the students earn from doing this laundry is used to help fund field trips. Class members have taken field trips to George Ranch, Palacios Marine Center, Lake Texana, the Rice Festival and LeTulle Park.

To earn extra spending money and to allow the students hands-on accounting skills, the class members sell chips, pickles, sodas, candy and homemade cookies to students. With that money, the students have shopped for Christmas presents at Target and for cooking, baking, and party supplies at Sam's and HEB.

Two students work for our school community. Joe Delgado works at the bus barn for Marcelleno Galvan and Stacy Vaculin works at Blessing Elementary School under the direction of Sharon Jones and Ms. Catheriner.

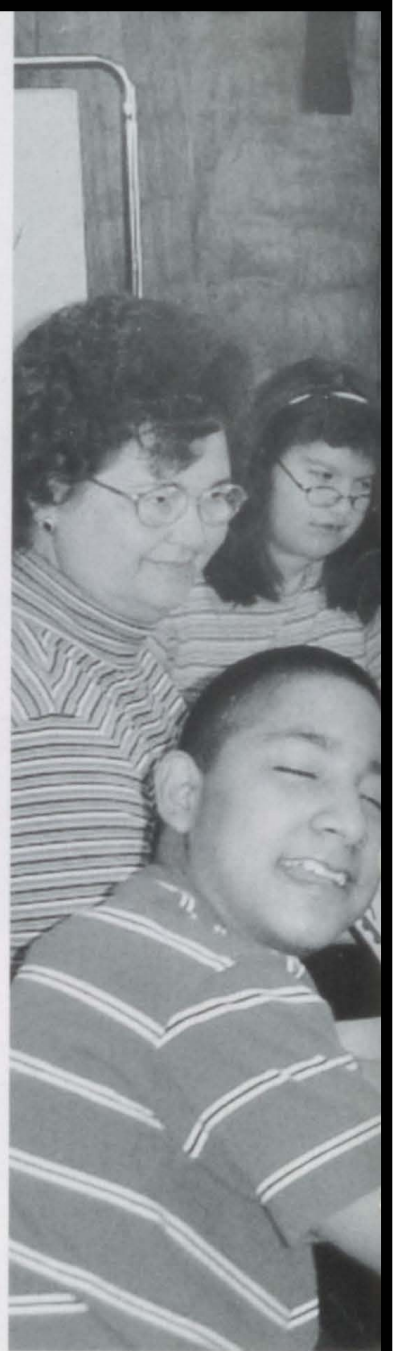

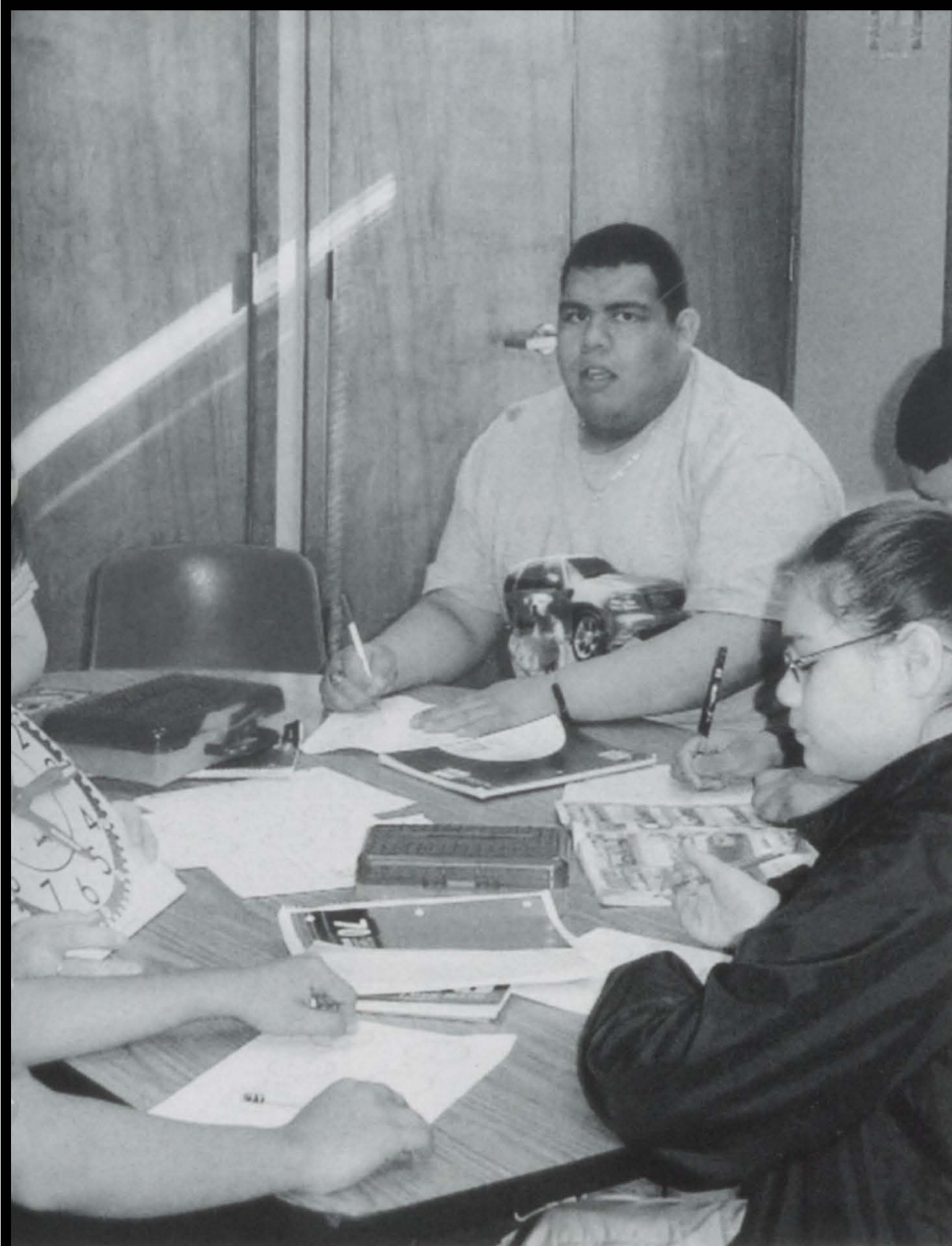

The Agriculture department offers a variety of classes, varying from Equine with Mr. Cornelius to Plant and Soil Science with Mr. Meinardus. Equine is designed to help students develop knowledge and skills pertaining to the selection, nutrition, reproduction, health and management of horses. In Plant and Soil Science, students study about the plant and soil science as it relates to soil and plant relationships that affect the production of food and fiber. Thanks to the students in this class, the front of the high school is decorated with flowers planted and maintained by the class. The students also have a vegetable garden at the Agriculture building that is under their care.

Another popular class in the Agriculture department is Agricultural Metal Fabrication Technology. Students develop technical skills in metal fabrication and joining processes through classroom instruction and laboratory activities. Special emphasis is given to AWS certification for entry-level welders. Animal Science is also a popular course. In this course, students develop knowledge and skills pertaining to the nutrition, reproduction, health, and management of domestic animals. Students are also made aware of the opportunities for careers in animal science.

In the Personal Skills Development course, students develop agricultural leadership, citizenship, and cooperation. This course also includes topics in personal development, employee/employer relations, and group and interpersonal communication skills.

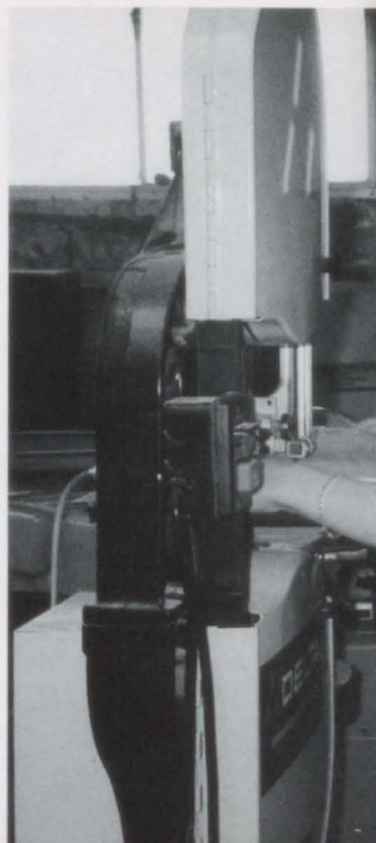

During the school year, students in Chemistry have many hands-on experiments to test their knowledge. In the class, students conducted field laboratory investigations, used scientific methods during investigations and made informed decisions using critical thinking and scientific problem solving. Students studied a variety of topics that included characteristics of matter, energy transformations during physical and chemical changes, the atomic structure and the periodic table of elements. Other topics that were covered included behavior of gases, bonding, nuclear fusion and fission, oxidation-reduction reactions, chemical equations, solutes, properties of solutions, acids and bases, and chemical reactions.

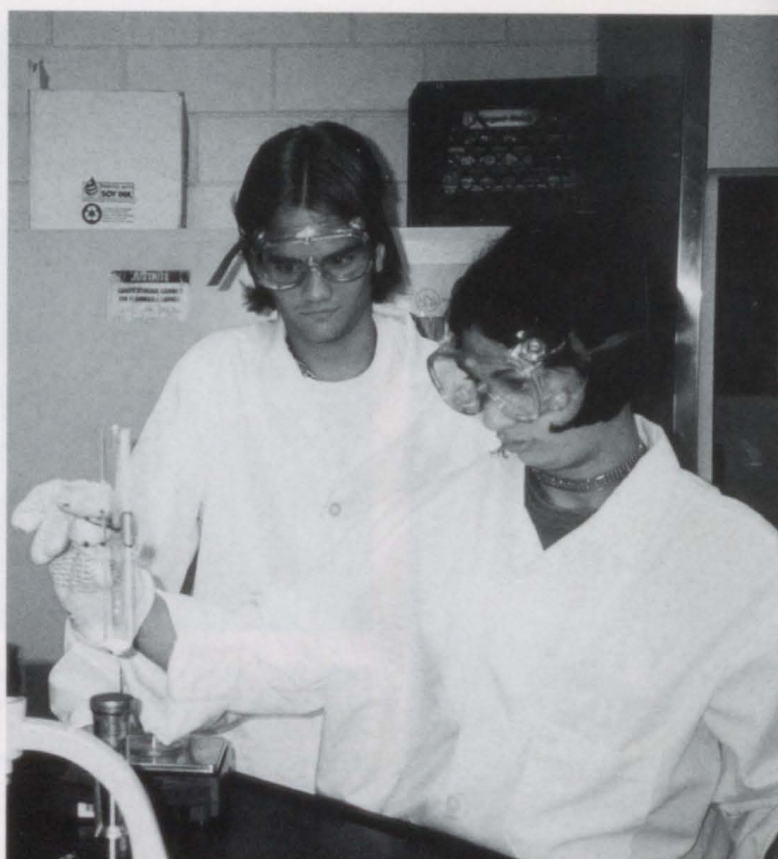

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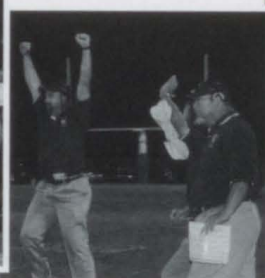

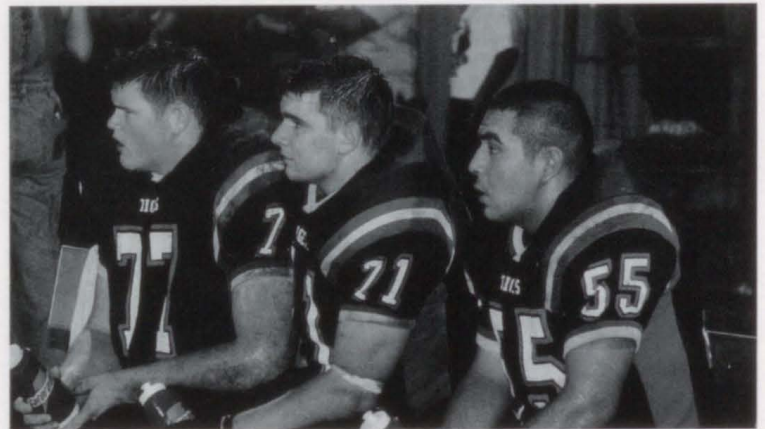

For Coach Finegan, the most memorable events were when the girls did win a game and she could see the look of victory in their eyes.

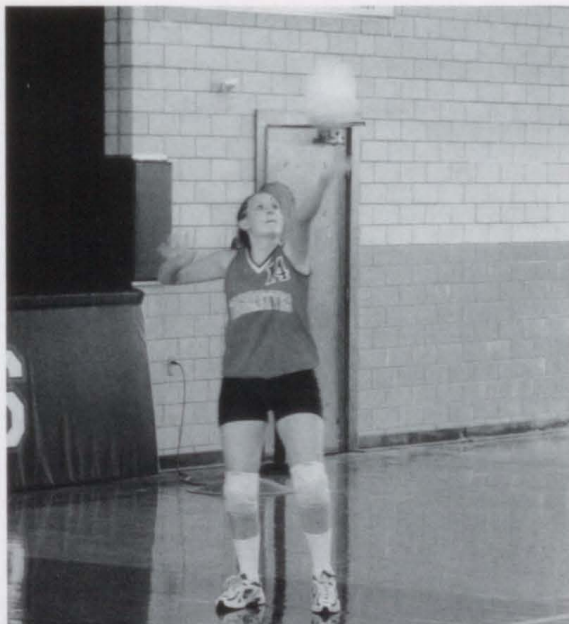

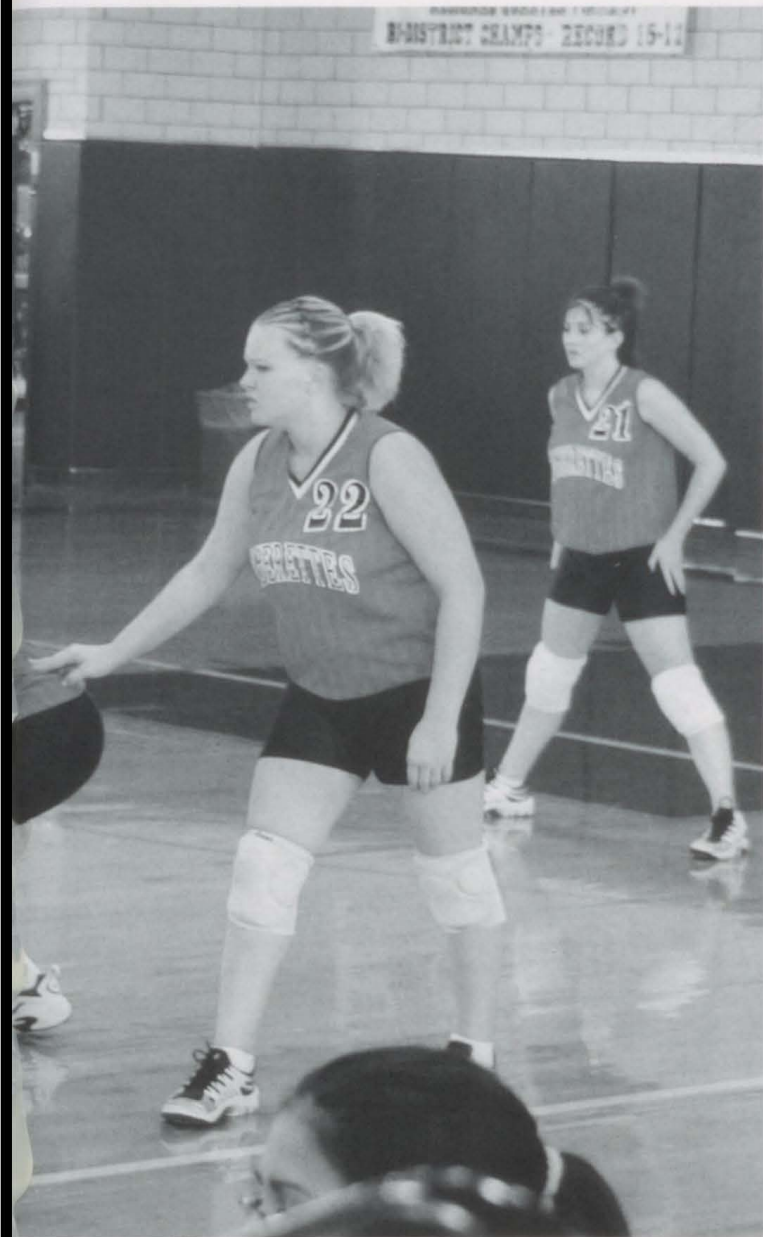

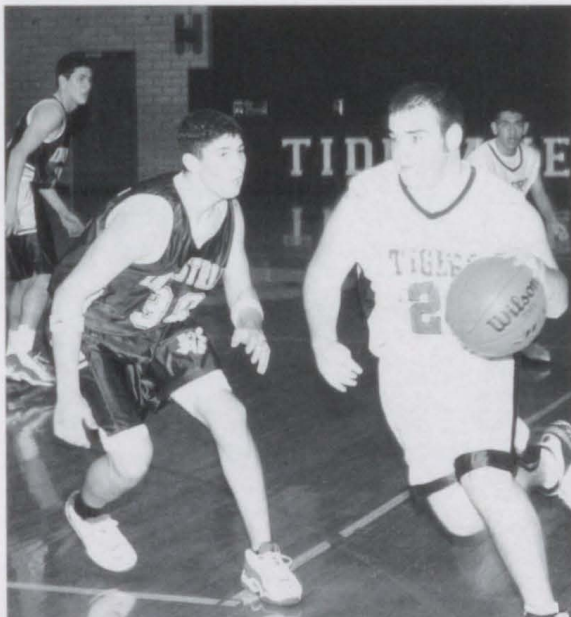

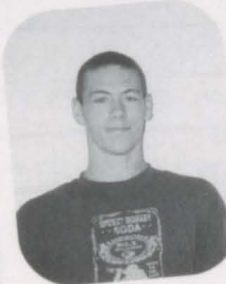

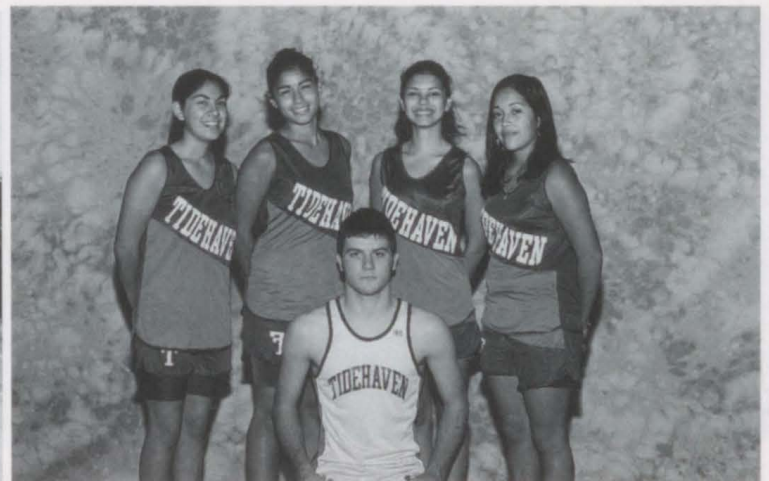

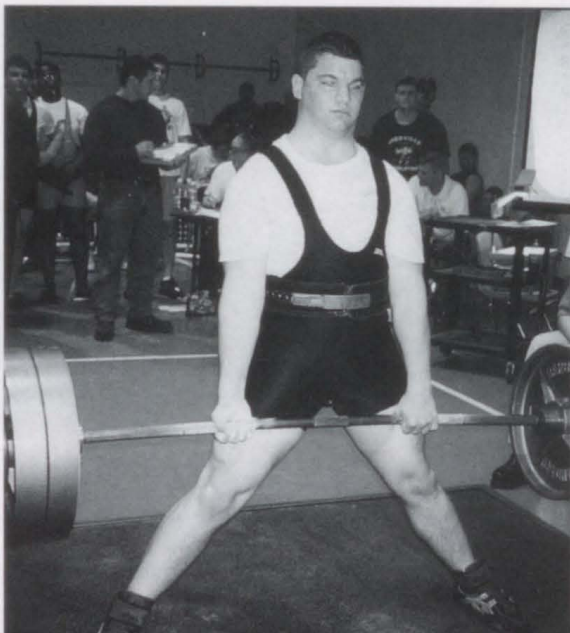

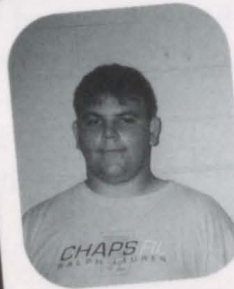

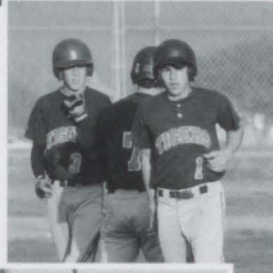
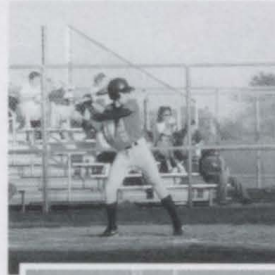
"THE WILL TO WIN IS VITAL"

Despite the losses, the Tigers showed a great amount of team work and had fun in the process.



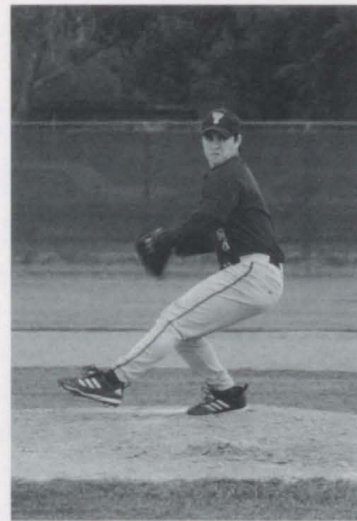

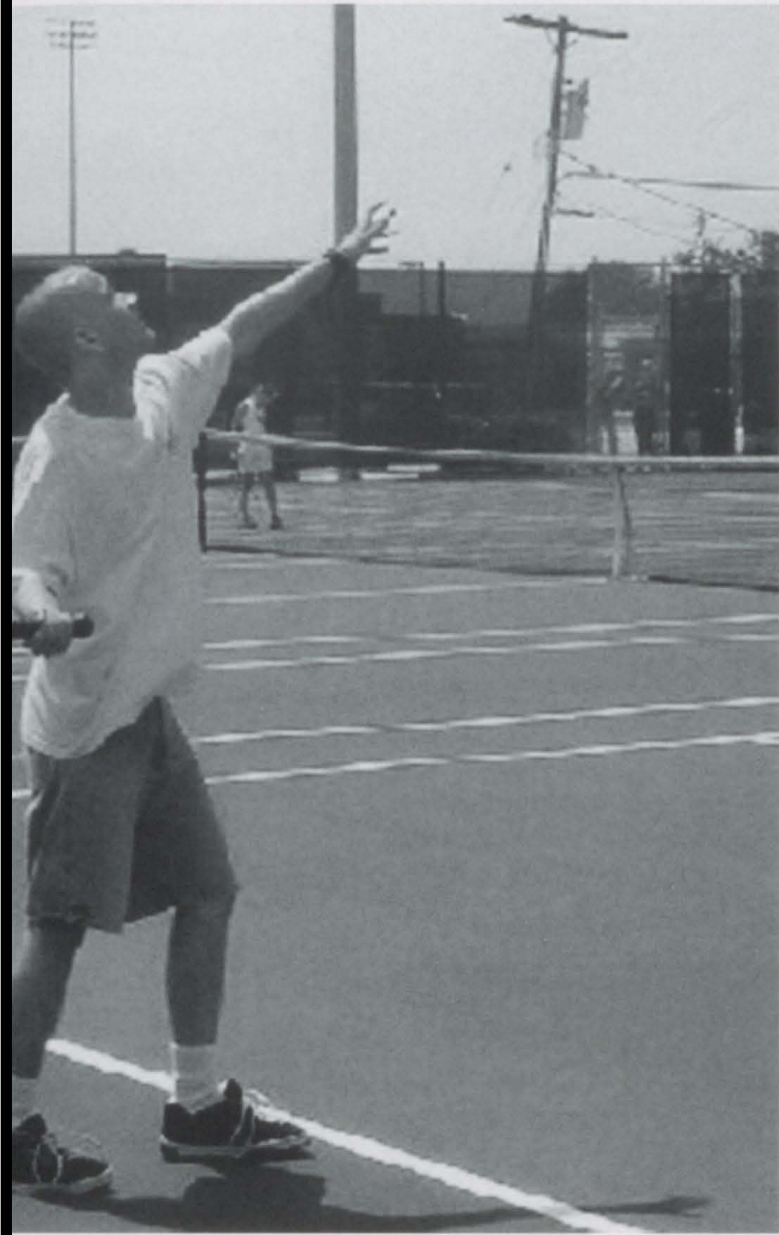

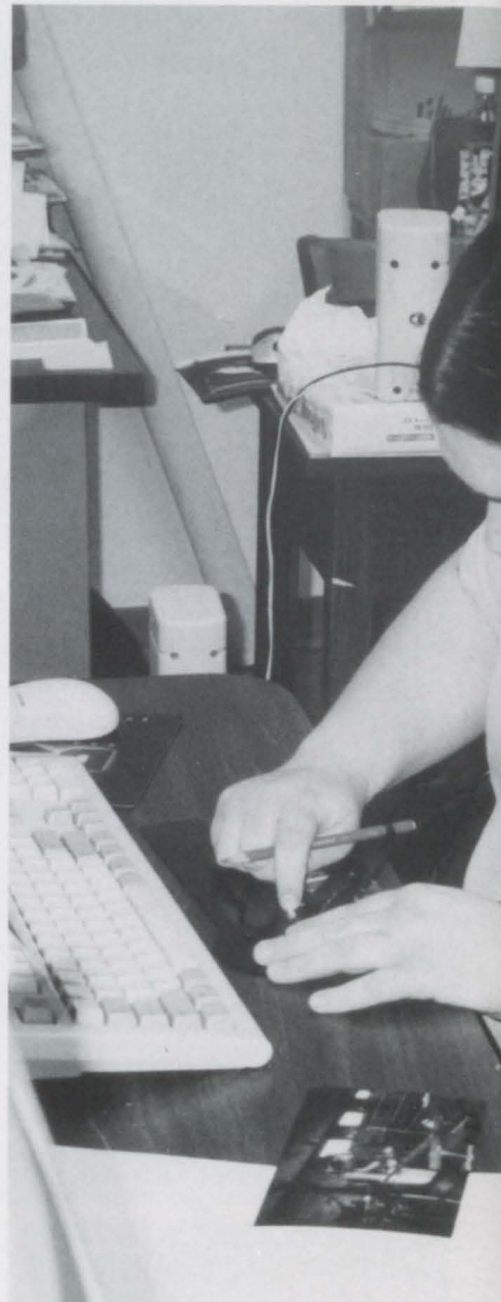

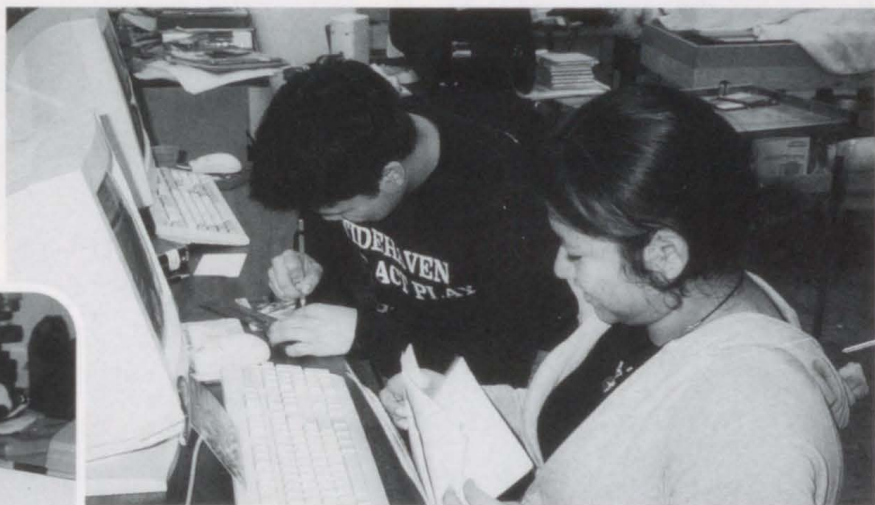

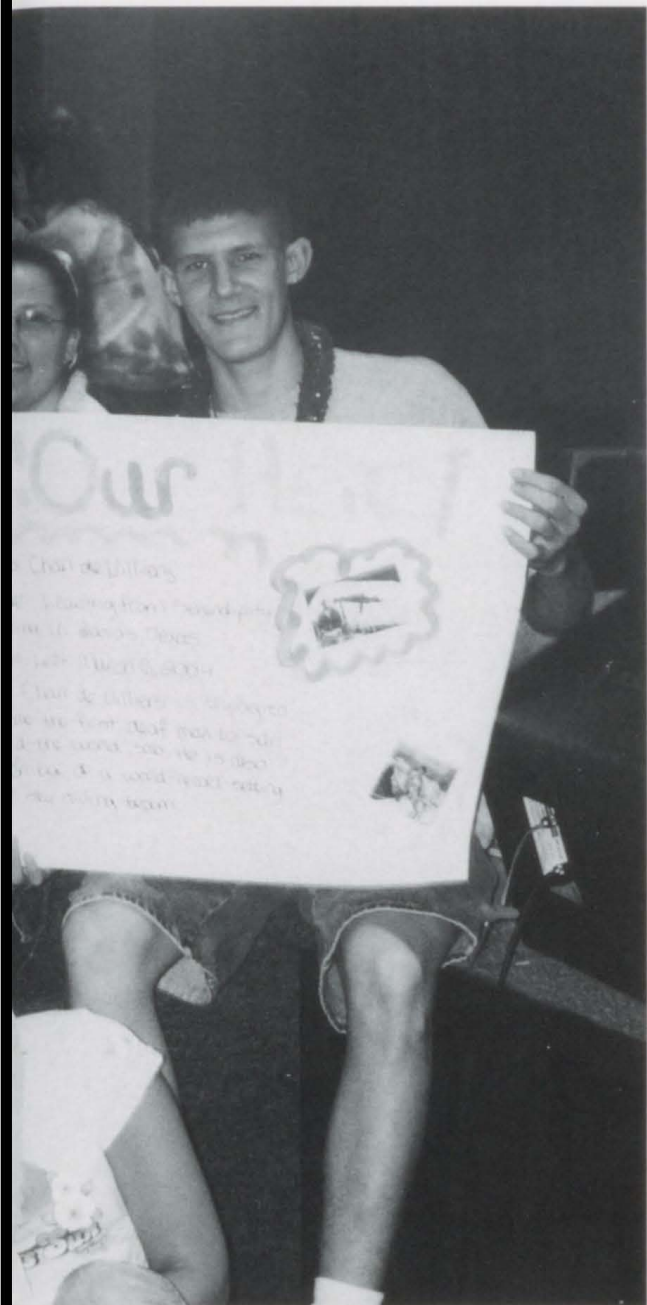
Throughout the year, members worked hard to accomplish their service hours by mentoring, peer tutoring, donating blood, and other community, church, and school-related activities.

Giving Back to the Community



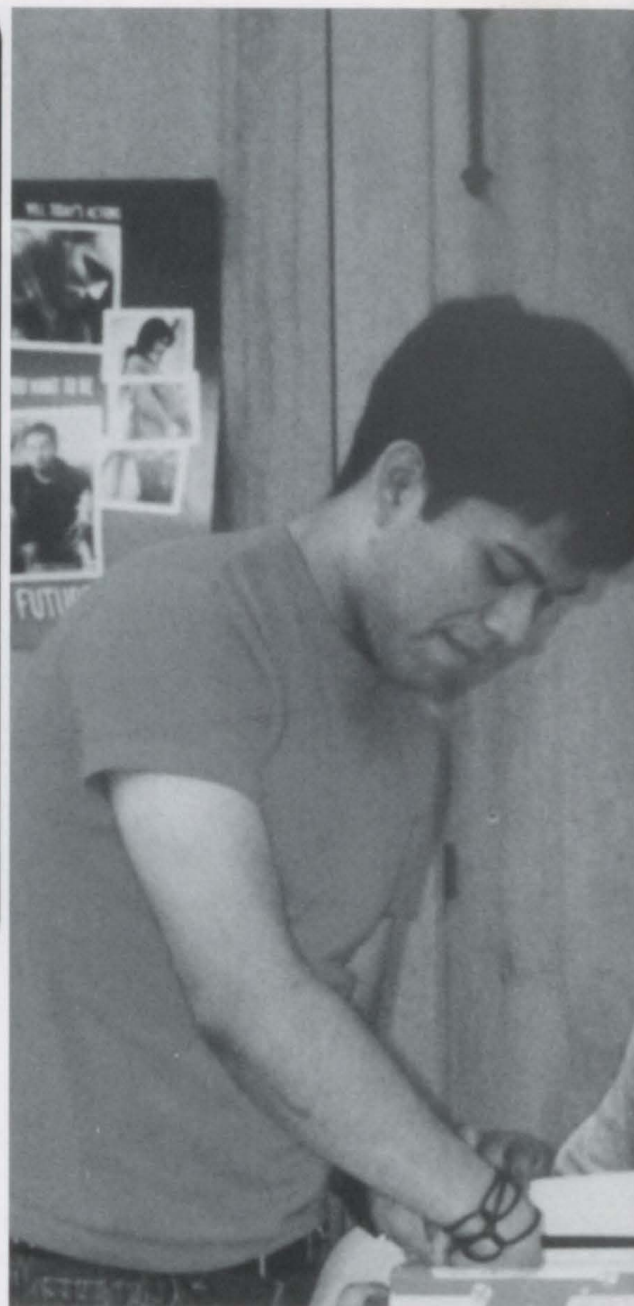

The club finished off their successful year with their annual trip to Astroworld.

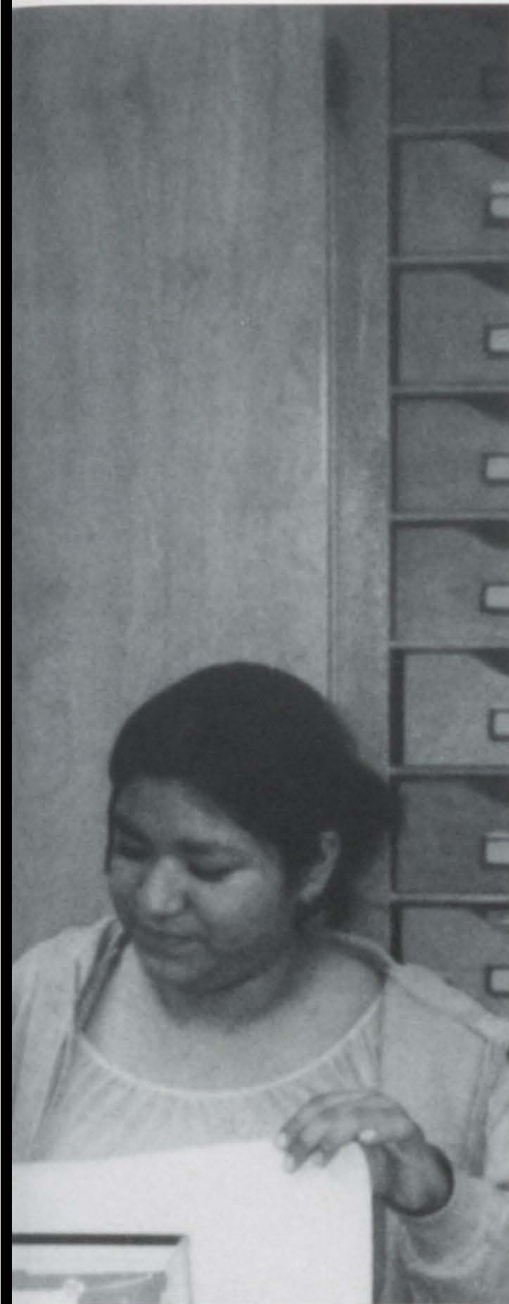

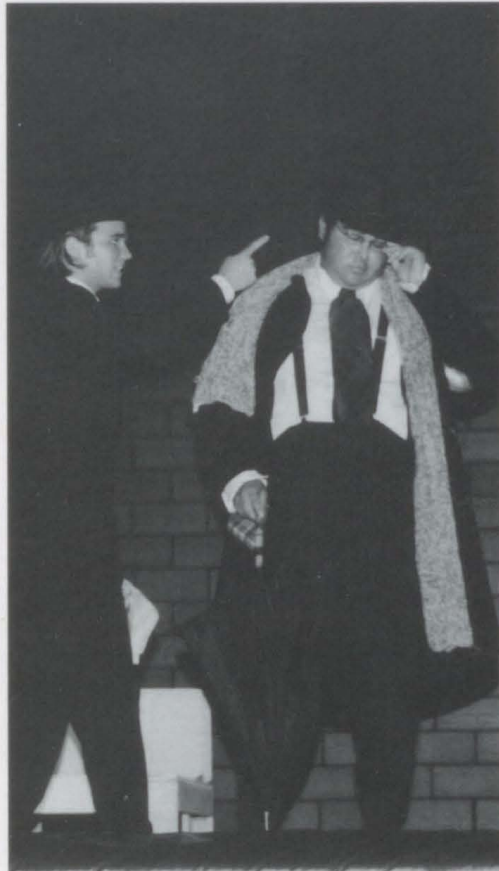

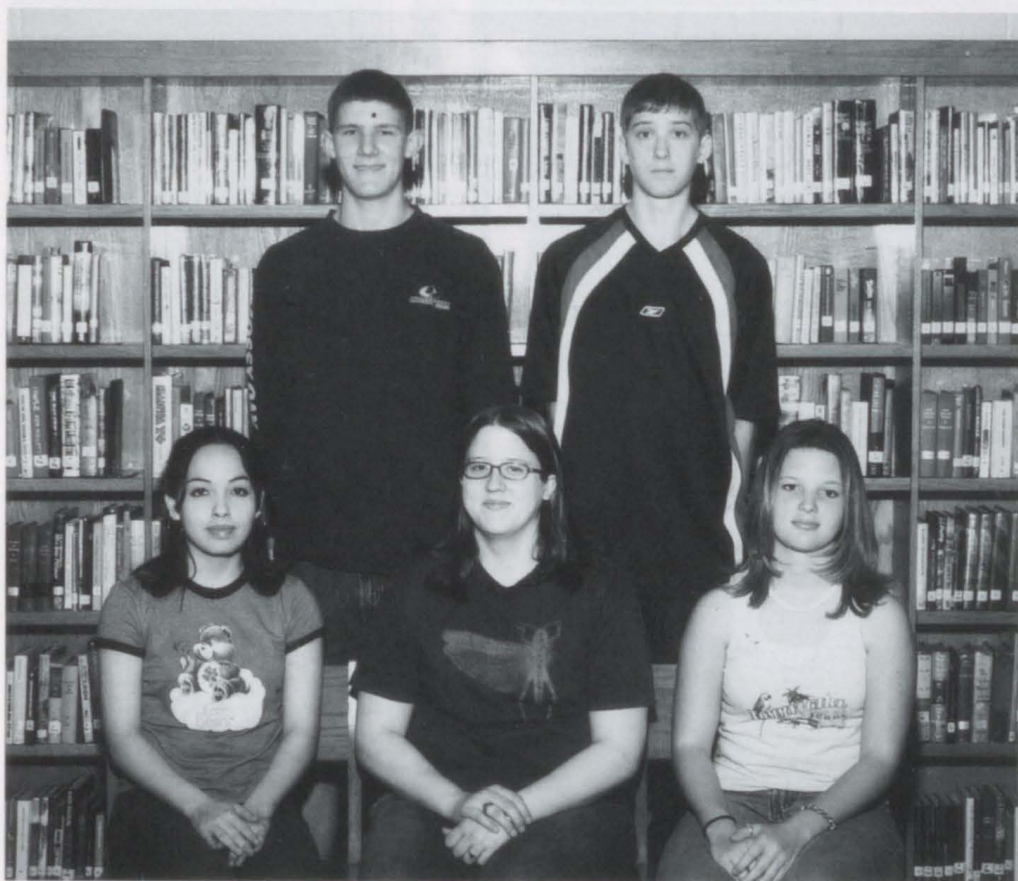

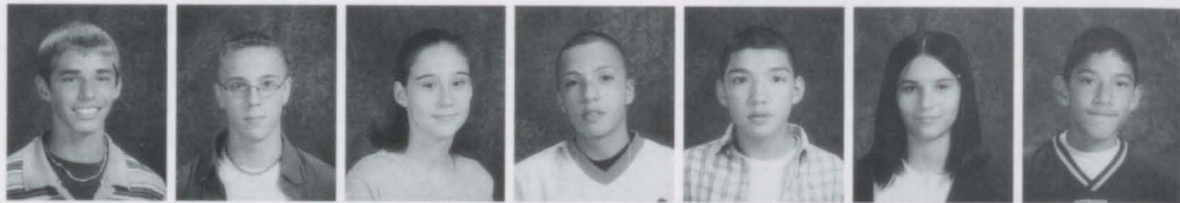
