







Actions & Reactions


Using Newton's Laws of Motions and the law of conservation of energy, projectile, motion and electricity, students in physics class constructed a catapult using discarded farm equipment. With the catapult loaded, the class then traveled to Texas A&M University in Kingsville to take part in the Javelina Engineering day competitions. All of the hard work paid off when the team returned home with a first place in the overall catapult division.

The students then used the Archimedes' principle of buoyancy which states than an object will float if its weight is equal to the weight of fluid displaced. 












Swinging Sentation Not Par for the Course

The Tiger yearbook staff members are proud to present this 2008 yearbook, "Me & You, We're in This Together", to the students and faculty of Tidehaven I.S.D. This 58th volume was printed by Taylor Publishing Company of Dallas at the El Paso plant. The press run was 120 copies consisting of 168 pages with 16 pages of color, printed on 80# enamel paper. Our Taylor representative for the last eight years, Ryan Almon, was a tremendous help to the staff by supplying us with his endless design ideas and wonderful support. Thanks, Ryan.

Prices for the book were \$30 until the end of November and \$35 until the end of March, with a cover name included in the cost. In April, the cost of the book was \$40 and did not include a cover name. Any unsold books were available on a first come basis in August with a price of \$45.

Individual portraits for all four schools and group pictures were taken by Lifetouch Studios of Stafford. Candid photos were primarily taken by staff photographers with some photos provided as a courtesy by others. Staff members used the Elitevision yearbook

computer program on four PCs to produce the yearbook.

Different fonts were used throughout the book. Student Life used Tyler, Wanton, and Athena fonts. Clubs, Academics, and Sports sections used Transpose, Vanguard, Rinna, and Rinna Italic. For the Student section, Alfonso, Tyler, and Rinna were the fonts used while in the Faculty section, Vanguard and Times were used. 


