THE PEP SQUAD, PERHAPS THE MOST COLORFUL ORGANIZATION IN HIGH SCHOOL, HAD ITS GENESIS BACK IN 1924 UNDER THE CAPABLE LEADERSHIP OF MRS. KEYE MORGAN INGRAM.

IN THE BEGINNING MEMBERSHIP WAS OPEN TO ALL GIRLS IN SCHOOL REGARDLESS OF AGE OR CLASSIFICATION. DURING THE FIRST SEASON THERE WERE TWELVE MEMBERS. BUT AS TIME PASSED, INCREASING INTEREST MEANT AN INCREASE IN NUMBER UNTIL FINALLY IT BECAME NECESSARY TO LIMIT MEMBERSHIP TO CERTAIN CLASSES. AFTER THE FIRST YEAR THE GRADE LIMIT WAS FROM THE ELEVENTH TO THE SIXTH. SINCE 1930 THE ORGANIZATION HAS BEEN OPEN TO HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS ONLY, AND DURING THE 1935 FOOTBALL SEASON THERE WERE EIGHTY MEMBERS OF THE PEP SQUAD.

THE GROUP HAS HAD THREE CHEER LEADERS SINCE 1927 AND THE 1934 SEASON GAVE AN ADDITIONAL ATTRACTION, LITTLE SARAH JANIN WILSON, MASCOT.

FOR THE PAST THREE YEARS THE GROUP HAS HAD THE LOYAL SUPPORT OF THE AMERICAN LEGION OF BAY CITY. THIS SUPPORT PLUS THE PERSONAL ASSISTANCE OF LEGIONAIRE SAM SELDIRK AND MR. ZACK DELANO, HAS MADE THE DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS POSSIBLE.



UNDER THE EFFICIENT LEADERSHIP OF MRS. INGRAM WHO HAS HAD THE SPONSORSHIP OF THE GROUP EVERY YEAR EXCEPT ONE SINCE ITS ORGANIZATION, THE "BLUE CADETS" OF BAY CITY HIGH SCHOOL HAS BECOME AN ORGANIZATION OF WHICH EVERY CITIZEN OF THE COMMUNITY IS PROUD.

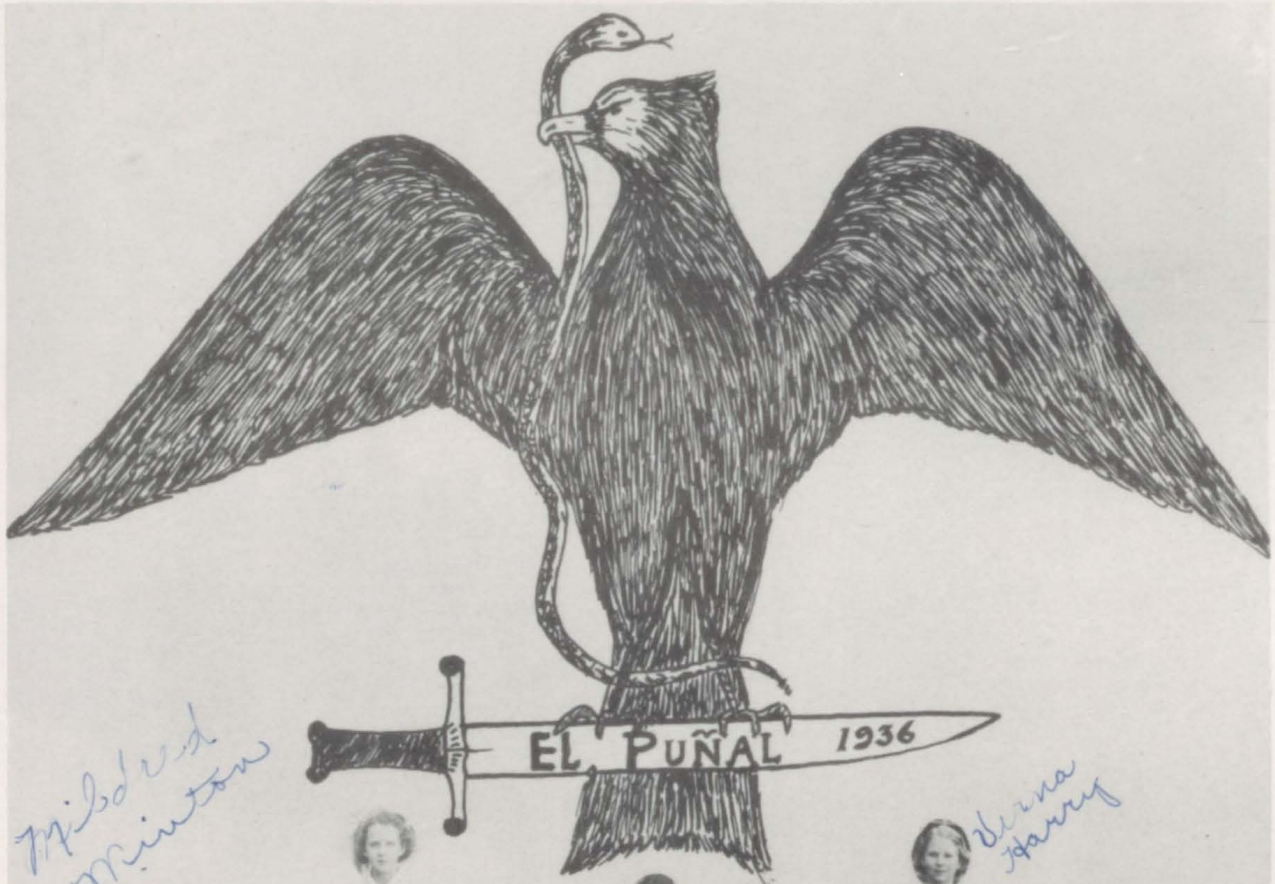

FOOTBALL SQUAD 1935

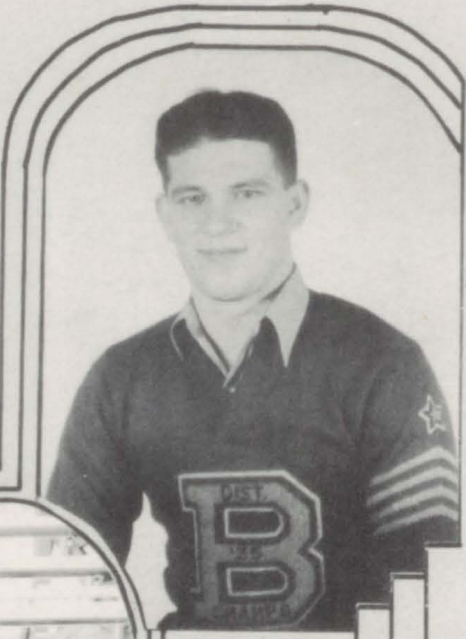
